

Liturgy and Prayer Resources for Catholic Communities During Suspension of Liturgical Celebrations Due to Coronavirus (2020)

During the period of suspension of public liturgies in response to the Coronavirus crisis, Catholics can take heart from one of the key decrees of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) on Christ's presence in the liturgy:

"Christ is always present in his Church, especially in its liturgical celebrations. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of his minister, 'the same now offering, through the ministry of priests, who formerly offered himself on the cross' but especially under the Eucharistic elements. By his power he is present in the sacraments, so that when a man baptises it is really Christ himself who baptises. He is present in his word, since it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. He is present, lastly when the Church prays and sings, for he promised: 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them'" (Mt 18:20).

[Vatican Council II, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (1963) art. 7]

If parishioners pray at home at the same time they would normally be together praying at Mass, there is a very real sense in which two or three are gathering in Christ's name, in the unity of their prayer rather than of their physical person. Individual and family prayer based on the Liturgy of the Word at Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours and other sources provides members of parishes and families with an opportunity to honour Christ's presence in the domestic Church as those present pray to God in thanksgiving for gifts received, and for the needs of the Church and the world.

SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

SERVING GOD THROUGH CAESAR

In the ancient world it was not uncommon for rulers to describe themselves as gods, claiming to have certain divine powers and qualities. The people of Israel would never allow their rulers to be called gods. There is only one God, the Lord. Their faith is expressed in today's psalm: 'The Lord is great and worthy of praise, to be feared above all gods (pagan rulers). The gods of the heathens are naught. It was the Lord who made the heavens'

The people of Israel were, however, tolerant of pagan rulers calling themselves gods. They saw these rulers as having a subordinate role in God's governance of the world. Through them, God's will could be accomplished among the peoples. A good example was Cyrus, the Persian king mentioned in today's first reading, whom the Jews saw as God's chosen instrument to liberate them from their exile in Babylon.

In our own day the leaders of nations have the power to effect good and promote the values of the kingdom of God. Not all leaders do this, but there are many who exercise wise and just leadership. There need not be an unbridgeable gulf between civil governance and the governance of God. In fulfilling our obligations toward the State, we can in fact be promoting the values of the kingdom of God. Respecting legitimate temporal authority is one means of paying homage to God, the only One to whom all praise and honour are due.

SING TO THE LORD OF ALL THE EARTH

Power is a theme that runs through today's readings.

The prophet Isaiah portrays God speaking to one of the great pagan kings of ancient history: Cyrus. God declares Cyrus to be an anointed servant of God, achieving God's purposes. God's entire purpose is that through Cyrus, God may be known as the only God there is.

Paul encourages the Christians in Thessalonika because from the first they accepted Paul's preaching not as mere words, but as power, but a very different kind of power from that exercised by Cyrus. It is open to God's Holy Spirit and to faith.

In Matthew's story of Jesus, we see a power play that Jesus wins. A group of Pharisees and some associates of King Herod try to trap Jesus in his talk. Their trap: should we pay taxes to the pagan Caesar or not?

Jesus springs a trap in reply. Two very important points in his response are unspoken, but would have been understood then. First, in the ancient world, the image on a coin meant that in a sense that coin belonged to the person pictured there. Since the tax-paying coin has Caesar's head on it, taxes can properly be paid to the loathed Romans. The second point is that human beings are made in the image of God, so what is owed to God is human worship — even if the Romans don't like it. Matthew concludes his story, 'They were amazed; and they left him and went away.' The real power of Jesus has the last word.
