EUCHARISTIC PRAYER I

There is almost universal agreement that the origins of the eucharistic prayer are to be found in a series of table prayers required at every Jewish meal. These assumed the greatest importance on such holy days as the feast of the Passover. Toward the beginning of the meal the father of the family or the presiding member of the community uttered a Jewish prayer of blessing, known in Hebrew as a *berakah*, which blessed or praised God. Holding the bread, the presider prayed: "Blessed are you, Lord, our God, king of the world, who has brought bread from heaven." The bread was then broken and distributed to those present.

EVCHARISTIC PRAYER I (cont.)

The various courses of the meal followed, with the Passover meal being distinguished by special foods, prayers, and the recitation of the *haggadah*. The latter interpreted the special meaning of the feast as one which made present God's liberating deeds of the past and applied their power to those celebrating the feast. Toward the end of the meal and over a cup of wine the presider said another, though more solemn and extensive *berakah* which, after an initial dialogue, consisted of three sections. The first praised God for all creation, especially the creation of life. The second was a thanksgiving for the whole history of salvation, i.e. for a desirable and ample land, for the covenant, for the law. The third section was a supplication that God's creative and redemptive action be continued and renewed, especially in the coming of the Messiah and in the restoration of the house of David. On certain festive occasions this section was expanded by a request that God accept the "remembrance" of his people, i.e. that God, ever faithful to his covenant, might continue to renew his great deeds.

The apostles continued to gather for table fellowship after Christ's Resurrection and Ascension. When they gathered to break bread, they did so "in memory" of the Lord. The traditional Jewish prayer forms over the bread and cup were used, although they were understood and perhaps somewhat altered in light of the primitive community's experience of the Lord. But already in apostolic times a process of simplification and unification occurred, perhaps in conjunction with the separation of the eucharist from the regular meal. Since the prayer over the bread was so brief, the more lengthy and theologically developed blessing over the cup was used as the basis for a prayer of praise and thanksgiving said over the bread and the wine together. It is from this prototype that the Eucharistic prayer evolved. There were no liturgical books: the presiding minister merely improvised over the *berakah's* structure. Eventually a more Christological colouring evolved and secondary elements were added. It was only in the fourth century that extemporariness gave way to fixed forms which differed according to geographic regions.


