Dear Parishioners of Sacred Heart,

Well as I am sure you are well aware by now, our parish is about to enter into a new era. With the combining of the parishes of Gardenvale/Brighton, Hampton Sandringham & Ricketts Point (Beaumaris and Black Rock) in one regional area, we are beginning a new time in the history of all those parishes.

Fr David Cartwright and Fr Dean Mathieson have both been appointed as parish priests who will work in solidarity over the whole area. Each will have the responsibilities, duties and rights of parish priests. Because they are working together, Fr David will be the moderator of the new ministry.

This is a new venture and much of the practical details and organization will have to be worked out "on the job".

These two priests have been very courageous and dedicated to take this task on. It is a tough assignment. They will need the understanding and generous cooperation of the parishioners to carry this through successfully.

It is important that the people of each of the parishes have a broad view of the new situation. No one can simply say we want things as they have always been, because that simply cannot be! Each of the parishes will have to extend their way of thinking to what is good for all.

The Archbishop's letter which has been and still is available to all, mentions the importance of lay leadership in this new venture. And the importance of that is quite evident. Frs David & Dean are going to need leadership groups and all parishioners to be ready to come to the party.

The whole Australian Church—as is also the case in many other countries—is facing the need to find ways not only to keep the Church going, but to stimulate and develop the life of the Church. A significant element in all of that is of course the shortage of priests.

So please put yourselves into this new venture.

We cannot look at anything from a purely pragmatic point of view. We cannot give in to looking only at appearances.


Faith in Christ is about faith in resurrection out of death—not only our physical death but anything that has the aura of dying about it. Sometimes we can talk about our present difficulties in the Church in a way that has the aura of a death about it. But standing with Christ in a moment when we feel that we can only say and ought always say "Into your hands, I commend my spirit".

The Fathers' answer to that prayer was to raise Jesus out of death; his answer to our same prayer will be to raise us again to life, to unexpected things, to new things, to discover new ways in following Jesus our Lord.
