

Liturgy and Prayer Resources for Catholic Communities During Suspension of Liturgical Celebrations Due to Coronavirus (2020)

During the period of suspension of public liturgies in response to the Coronavirus crisis, Catholics can take heart from one of the key decrees of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) on Christ's presence in the liturgy:

"Christ is always present in his Church, especially in its liturgical celebrations. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of his minister, 'the same now offering, through the ministry of priests, who formerly offered himself on the cross' but especially under the Eucharistic elements. By his power he is present in the sacraments, so that when a man baptises it is really Christ himself who baptises. He is present in his word, since it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. He is present, lastly when the Church prays and sings, for he promised: 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them'" (Mt 18:20).

[Vatican Council II, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (1963) art. 7]

If parishioners pray at home at the same time they would normally be together praying at Mass, there is a very real sense in which two or three are gathering in Christ's name, in the unity of their prayer rather than of their physical person. Individual and family prayer based on the Liturgy of the Word at Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours and other sources provides members of parishes and families with an opportunity to honour Christ's presence in the domestic Church as those present pray to God in thanksgiving for gifts received, and for the needs of the Church and the world.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

LISTEN TO GOD'S VOICE TODAY

Psalm 95 (94) is a hymn of praise introducing the people to God's presence. It served to remind the Jewish people as they came into the temple that they were entering a sacred place. When we gather for liturgy we too come into the presence of God in a special way. As Jesus tells us in today's Gospel, 'Where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them'.

Our awareness of God's presence fills us with a sense of humble awe prompting us to bow before God. We are also filled with joy and sing God's praises. Such songs and gestures have meaning only if we have a genuine desire to listen to God's voice. If we come to liturgy with hardened hearts, our songs and gestures are mere hypocritical show.

In the liturgy God speaks to us in many ways — in the Scripture readings, the prayers, the silences, the hymns, the ministers and the worshipping community, even in the baby crying a few pews away. 'Lord, what are you saying to me in this disturbance?', we might pray.

God speaks to us in other ways as well — in the brother or sister who courageously calls us back to God; in the prophets who stand sentry for our society and point out where we are going wrong, often at great personal cost; in the members of our community who seek to reconcile differences.

O that today we will listen to God's voice.

LISTEN TO THE VOICE OF THE LORD!

How do we know the will of God for us? Today's readings show that we do not need to guess at the will of God; rather, God gives us ways to discern God's will.

Sometimes there is a prophetic figure in our midst, like the prophet Ezekiel, who must speak the word of God that he or she hears. However, each person has the responsibility to heed God's prophet.

For this reason, the Psalm sings 'O that today you would listen to the Lord — harden not your hearts!' The Psalm notes that we know God's voice from events in our lives that show God acting to care for us.

In Romans, Paul writes that in imitation of Jesus we live by his law of agapē love, 'the debt of mutual love.' Paul shows that the ancient 'ten commandments' are summed up in this law. Paul preaches Jesus' vision of a love of mutual vulnerability and mutual benefit, in which there is no place for habitual, exploitative dominance of one over another.

Finally, Matthew presents Jesus giving advice to the Christian community about how to resolve conflict that will inevitably arise. Both the person acting wrongly and the community must be treated with dignity. Jesus himself promises that he will be with the community assembled, whose decisions heaven will respect, whether of binding or of loosing from obligation. Praying and working together reasonably, the Christian community can have the courage to go ahead in history, making the decisions that are necessary for the good of the community.

We pray for all affected by natural disasters, human catastrophes and atrocities, or accidental misadventure, particularly N. ______: that those who lost their lives will find peace and rest in Christ and that local communities, families and individuals will be strengthened to assist the injured and to rebuild their lives. We pray to the Lord.

We pray for all who have died recently, especially those who have died in aged care, the victims of the COVID-19 virus and those whose anniversaries occur around this time, especially N._______: that they will rest in the peace of Christ and rise in glory on the last day. We pray to the Lord.
