



TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (20 September 2020)

Liturgy and Prayer Resources for Catholic Communities During Suspension of Liturgical Celebrations Due to Coronavirus (2020)

During the period of suspension of public liturgies in response to the Coronavirus crisis, Catholics can take heart from one of the key decrees of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) on Christ's presence in the liturgy:

"Christ is always present in his Church, especially in its liturgical celebrations. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of his minister, 'the same now offering, through the ministry of priests, who formerly offered himself on the cross' but especially under the Eucharistic elements. By his power he is present in the sacraments, so that when a man baptises it is really Christ himself who baptises. He is present in his word, since it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. He is present, lastly when the Church prays and sings, for he promised: 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them'" (Mt 18:20).

[Vatican Council II, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (1963) art. 7]

If parishioners pray at home at the same time they would normally be together praying at Mass, there is a very real sense in which two or three are gathering in Christ's name, in the unity of their prayer rather than of their physical person. Individual and family prayer based on the Liturgy of the Word at Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours and other sources provides members of parishes and families with an opportunity to honour Christ's presence in the domestic Church as those present pray to God in thanksgiving for gifts received, and for the needs of the Church and the world.

GOSPEL Matthew 20:1–16 (JB)

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too."

In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat."

He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?"

Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'

SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

ENVY AT GOD'S GENEROSITY

Verses from Psalm 145(144) are used frequently in the responsorial psalm at Mass. While different verses are chosen for various liturgies, verses 8 and 9 are invariably included, as is the case today (second stanza). These verses contain Israel's oldest theological assertion about God – 'The Lord is kind, full of compassion, slow to anger, abounding in love, good and compassionate to all'. From the time of the exodus from Egypt (Exodus 34:6–7) this was to be the Israelites' experience of God.

Today's liturgy puts to us a question that, at first sight, is quite surprising: Are we happy that God is good and compassionate to all?

Certainly, we are pleased that God is merciful towards ourself. But how do we feel when we observe the mercy of God towards others, especially those we feel are less deserving of God's love? Are we like the workers in the vineyard mentioned in today's Gospel parable who have worked all day and feel resentful that the owner is so generous to the latecomers? Perhaps we feel that God is more generous to others than to us.

The prophet Isaiah tells us that such thoughts are evil and should be abandoned. Though God's ways are often beyond our comprehension, we can be sure that the kindness of God flows also to us without measure or limit. Rather than be resentful, let us rejoice with all creation in God whose mercy and compassion far surpass any of our limited notions of fairness and justice.

THE LORD IS GOOD TO ALL

Today, the Scripture readings present us with oddly contradictory images of God. On the one hand, the prophet Isaiah stresses that God is as far above us as the heavens are high above earth. At the same time, the Psalm says that 'the Lord is near to all who call him.' Perhaps there is truth in both images.

In his letter to the Philippians, Paul tosses between two extremes. On the one hand, he longs to be fully with Christ, no longer in this world. He desires already to reach the goal for which he spends his whole life. Yet, to enable other people to share in the knowledge of the Risen Lord that has transformed Paul's own life, it is better that Paul stay as he is. For Paul, union with Christ is so close, yet at the same time, far away.

In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable in which God seems both close and very remote. Jesus makes God 'close' to us by telling a story about an ordinary human experience to reveal something of God to us. In such a situation, we human beings must strive to be fair and equitable. Jesus' point is that God operates on a basis that goes far beyond mere fairness and equity. God operates on the basis of lavish generosity. We are wise to see how much this advantages each one of us, and to be grateful for it. With the Psalm, we rejoice that God can be both just and compassionate at the same time.

We pray for all affected by natural disasters, human catastrophes and atrocities, or accidental misadventure, particularly N. _____: that those who lost their lives will find peace and rest in Christ and that local communities, families and individuals will be strengthened to assist the injured and to rebuild their lives. We pray to the Lord.

We pray for all who have died recently, especially those who have died without family support, the victims of the COVID-19 virus and those whose anniversaries occur around this time, especially N. _____: that they will rest in the peace of Christ and rise in glory on the last day. We pray to the Lord.
