

Liturgy and Prayer Resources for Catholic Communities During Suspension of Liturgical Celebrations Due to Coronavirus (2020)

During the period of suspension of public liturgies in response to the Coronavirus crisis, Catholics can take heart from one of the key decrees of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) on Christ's presence in the liturgy:

"Christ is always present in his Church, especially in its liturgical celebrations. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of his minister, 'the same now offering, through the ministry of priests, who formerly offered himself on the cross' but especially under the Eucharistic elements. By his power he is present in the sacraments, so that when a man baptises it is really Christ himself who baptises. He is present in his word, since it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. He is present, lastly when the Church prays and sings, for he promised: 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them'" (Mt 18:20).

[Vatican Council II, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (1963) art. 7]

If parishioners pray at home at the same time they would normally be together praying at Mass, there is a very real sense in which two or three are gathering in Christ's name, in the unity of their prayer rather than of their physical person. Individual and family prayer based on the Liturgy of the Word at Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours and other sources provides members of parishes and families with an opportunity to honour Christ's presence in the domestic Church as those present pray to God in thanksgiving for gifts received, and for the needs of the Church and the world.

GOSPEL

Matthew 21:33-43 (JB)

He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone.

This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'

SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

WHY, O GOD?

When tragedy strikes a community it always takes time before the people can begin to understand something of why it happened and perhaps derive some lessons for the future. In the immediate aftermath, such thinking is impossible. Traumatised, shocked and heartbroken, they can only cry out, 'Why?'.

This cry was never far from the lips of the struggling Jewish people. The Book of Psalms contains more than 50 laments in which individuals and communities cry out to God in distress. The troubles they voice are many and varied: sickness, military defeat, poverty, injustice, ridicule, loneliness. The emotions they express cover the full gamut: anger, hatred, sorrow, puzzlement, shock, longing. Often God is the object of the people's reproach.

Today's responsorial psalm is a classic lament. Israel, the beautiful vine planted and nurtured by God, has been destroyed in battle. In shock, the people lay the blame squarely on God: 'Why have you broken down our walls? Why did you turn your back and allow our enemies to trample over us?' Later, prophets like Isaiah will explain God's action. For now the people can only ask 'why?' and beg God to turn back to them.

When we are struck by tragedy, we should take our grief directly to God. Lament is a healthy prayer in which the evils that beset us are brought into the open in an honest and courageous manner. If we can but call upon God's name, life will come to us in the midst of sorrow.

LET YOUR FACE SHINE ON US

Three of our four readings today use a famous biblical image, that of Israel as the vineyard of the Lord, to reflect on the relationship between God and Israel.

Isaiah presents an imagined court case between God and God's people. The prophet proposes that God sues Israel for failing to deliver its side of a covenant, when it does not produce sweet grapes in due time. In very dramatic style, God is first counsel for the prosecution against Israel and then judge. God's judgement is grave; the failed vineyard will be completely destroyed.

However, the psalm appeals against God's judgement. It reminds God of the loving effort God made to bring the vine out of Egypt, and to settle it in the land of Canaan. Promising that the people will never forsake God again, the Psalm appeals to God's creative side: 'protect your vine, let you face shine on us ...'

Jesus then tells a parable that focuses on the tenants of the vineyard. The tenants rapidly resort to violence and then murder to defraud the landowner of his rightful income from his vineyard. Jesus' listeners deliver the moral of the story, which is as violent as the behaviour of the tenants, betraying much about Jesus' audience. Jesus responds to their interpretation with the image of the most unlikely stone being chosen to be the one on which the whole building is aligned. Both images here refer to Jesus, the beloved son of God, God's chosen cornerstone.

Finally, Paul exhorts us to be formed on this cornerstone — Christ, in whom we have peace.
