Mission and Stewardship Teams

These groups will meet on Tuesday and Wednesday night this week. The Mission Team will consider all the proposals for the Sunday Mass timetable and these will be shared with you very soon.

Business Manager

This week we have engaged a Business Manager to assist us in the oversight of the parishes and the management of finances, property etc. We are pleased that Mr Charlie Mellican has accepted the position to assist us in this time of setting up the Mission structures. Charlie will be present at the Stewardship and Mission Team meetings this week., and he had a chance to meet the parish staff this week.

Sacrament of Reconciliation / Confessions

Following the slight easing of restrictions, there is an allowance for a small gathering of no more than five people outside a Place of Worship. The 'guidelines' state:

Religious Gatherings: Can also take place outdoors with five people plus a faith leader. Must be adjacent to the place of worship with only one group permitted at a time. You can only travel up to 5km from your home to attend a gathering and only for 2 hours.

Within the constraints of these guidelines, we are now able to offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation outdoors, with some social distancing and face masks. Confessions will be available this Saturday afternoon outside Stella Maris church, Beaumaris from 4-5pm. To comply with government rules, there is only allowed to be a maximum of five people waiting at any time in the designated space. If there are five people waiting, please remain in your car, or at a distance. Please also remember to wear a face mask and observe social distancing.



Baptisms

As we are allowed to have a religious gathering outside, we are able to offer the Sacrament of Baptism, outside the church building (but in the vicinity of it) with a maximum of five people. We are aware that quite a number of people have children waiting for baptism. If you would like to proceed, observing the limitations of numbers and spacing, please email your parish office and we will make arrangements for you.

Praying and meeting together

As the current restrictions allow religious gatherings of five people and a 'faith leader' we will next week look at how we can facilitate some gathering of five people outside the churches for a time of prayer and sharing together.

On Wednesday morning our Safeguarding committee met and we are well on the way to formulating some policies and procedures for our communities with a common Statement of Commitment, Code of Conduct and Policy Document.

On Wednesday evening we had a very informative Zoom meeting with the representatives of the St Vincent de Paul Conferences from Gardenvale, Brighton, Sandringham and Ricketts Point. They shared some of the great work that they are doing and the generosity of the communities and the work of the members. A very pleasing thing was the great support that the parishes and schools provide to the Conferences. This year that Christmas Appeal will be a very significant thing for the Society as they seek to help those in our communities who are particularly feeling the effects of COVID -19. The Conferences will always welcome new members and can be contacted through each parish office by email.

On Thursday morning we had a Zoom meeting with the secretaries from our communities and in particular we looked at how we can work together with the parish bulletin. You may see a few changes to the formats of the bulletin in coming weeks, as we try to streamline things a little bit to reduce some workload for our secretaries and work together.

On Thursday afternoon we met with our Pastoral workers from our communities and we spoke about the current challenges of our people and how we can also begin to prepare people for sacraments.



With such things as the Grand Final (albeit in a 'foreign land') and the blossoming of Spring around us, we can begin to sense some hope and change around us. Let us continue to pray that this change extends to us Catholics and people of all faiths who seek to return to public worship in out spiritual homes.

Recently a Letter was issued by Cardinal Robert Sarah, Prefect of the Congregation of Divine Worship in Rome, addressing the present situation:

The Christian community has never sought isolation and has never made the Church a city with closed doors.....As soon as circumstances permit, it is necessary and urgent to return to the normality of Christian life, which has the church building as its home and the celebration of the liturgy, especially the Eucharist....

Aware that God never abandons the humanity he created, and that even the hardest trials can bear fruits of grace, we have accepted our distance from the Lord's altar as a time of Eucharistic fasting, useful for us to rediscover its vital importance, beauty and immeasurable preciousness. As soon as possible, however, we must return to the Eucharist with a purified heart, with a renewed amazement, with an increased desire to meet the Lord, to be with him, to receive him and to bring him to our brothers and sisters with the witness of a life full of faith, love and hope.
